

MINING TOWNS OF ALDER GULCH

By the summer of 1863 the landscape of the Alder Gulch had become a series of small mining communities. Many areas of these gold bearing locations were richer then others, which created large population booms until the placer gold was all panned out.

Up Alder Gulch from Virginia City were smaller districts which included Beartown, Highland, Pine Grove and Summit. Going down the Gulch from Virginia City were Elkhorn, Central City, Nevada City, Slater's Bar, German Bar, Idaho Bar, Adobetown and Junction City. All were historically important in early Alder Gulch days. Some of these mining towns lasted longer than others and can be seen today. Summit was the last center of population up Alder Gulch. The settlement there was formed by some placer miners, but it was quartz mining that brought most people to the area. Some of the important mines at that time included the Kearsarge, High Up, Marietta, and Easton Pacific. Nevada City, down the Gulch from Virginia City, was a well established mining town in the early 1860's. Many business houses sprang up at this location as there was a great number of miners that had worked in the area and many of the buildings are still standing. This historic mining community has been restored in part by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bovey. Nevada City was named after Nevada City, Nevada, another mining community. They also moved several buildings from lost gold rush towns from Salisbury to Summit into Nevada City for historic preservation.


Adobetown, the next mining community after Nevada City, was named for the fact that many of its early day buildings were made of adobe bricks, a combination of dried mud and grass. The walls were put up with this building material and usually the roof was made up of poles or brush with dirt on top. Once this dirt was packed, it would shed water very nicely. Adobetown boasted a store, post office, meat market and other businesses in keeping with the times. The main store in Adobetown was owned and operated by Nicholas Carey. One of the first public schools in the Territory of Montana was started in Adobetown. This school house has been moved to Nevada City and is viewed by many sightseers every year.

Junction City was located where Granite Creek flows into Alder Gulch and one mile from Adobetown The population would grow to around 100 residents. A mechanic shop/livery, meat market and small stores made up this small town and was more of a residential and farming community. The soil was perfect for growing produce and "truck gardens" were created to grow and sell near and far. A few farm buildings can still be found in the Junction area. It was also surrounded with good placer mines

and rich quartz lodes. In this immediate area, many hundreds of Chinese were working over placer areas already worked by the first miners. Most of the Chinese miners were located between Water Gulch and Junction. It was said that President Grover Cleveland came to Junction City in 1891 campaigning for his second term on a trip to West Yellowstone.

Summit City was located near the head waters of Alder Creek and seven miles south of Virginia City. It was one of the most prosperous mining towns in Montana. It sported a population of up to three hundred during the mining boom times. The mines were rich in gold bearing quartz lodes with many placer diggings in the vicinity that paid from \$8 to \$10 per day. There were six quartz mills adjoining the town that provided many jobs for the miners traveling through. The town had several stores, mechanic shops and miners homes. There were also many gardens in this area that raised many variety's of vegetables to sell throughout the area.

Time has marched on, but the history can still be seen today in and around Nevada City.
