### LOCAL VINTAGE POSTCARDS NOW AVAILABLE AT BEACON BUSINESS CENTER

In discussing the problem of how to prevent the local trade from going to the retail mail order houses the country merchant must never lose sight of the fact that he who has money to spend has the inalienable right to spend it where and whatever manner he may elect, with out being subject to criticism from any source. We all know that in the early days of Montana, perhaps, before the coming in many sections of the railway, necessarily, prices must be higher owing to excessive cost of transportation. Now, in a great measure, this condition is changed and goods can be brought in at a comparatively small cost. Consequently the store can sell at much lower prices then formerly. It, therefore, is up to the merchant after marking his goods at a fair margin of profit to show this class of customers that his prices are no higher that the Eastern prices are, plus freight or express charges. There is no doubt but that these people would prefer to spend their money at home and the merchant has only himself to blame for the loss of their trade, but loud talk alone will not do it. Money makes the mare go, and right prices is the money and trade is the mare, in this case. Another class of "importers" is the customer, who is so thoroughly wedded to the "sending away" system that he or she, doesn't take the time or the trouble to look into the offerings at home for whatever may be wanted. He takes it for granted that it is not to be had or that it is better, or cheaper in price if bought out of the catalogue.

The question: Why should people trade at home? The one and certainly the principal reason is that you can be served as well, if not better at home, than by any distant mail order house. When you go home and open your package of purchases from us or any reliable merchant, examine them again and if there is anything among them that doesn't suit you, bring it back the next time you come in: you'll get your money back cheerfully every time and at once without any questions. Isn't that worth considering? Sometimes, you know, you are in a hurry to get home and can't take your time to decide, so just remember this: if it doesn't suit you bring it back and get your money. If we can sell you something else afterward, we'll be glad to, but you get your money first. When you get anything from a mail order house it is quite different. Those who have had the experience know this too well. In fact there is so much trouble in connection with sending back goods that in most cases goods are kept, rather that to "bother with it." And the mail order house is well aware of this fact. They know what it means to the ordinary man or woman to return good by express, or in any other way. Then again, occasionally goods are lost or damaged in transit, which means no end of corresponding, besides being out of your goods and money. To get a claim from an express or railroad company is a matter from three months to two years time. That is if you ever get it at all, and never without a considerable lot of red tape. In fact, in case of a small claim, the game is not worth the candle.

Do retail mail order houses sell goods cheap? The retail mail order houses take an occasional well know item, cut i's price to the bone and advertise this "leader" extensively from Maine to California. The bulk of their wares are not sold cheaply. They have to pay hight rents, high clerk hire, and expense of infinite details which pile their ration of expense up beyond that of any well conducted retail store. In addition, for them, advertising add at least a straight 10 per cent to expenses. All this has to be added to the price of their wares, besides making profit on them. Again, when you send to a mail order house, your money accompanies your order; you are practically paying for the goods from 10 to 30 days in advance and sometimes longer. We would gladly send for any article that we might be out of and you should want, and we would not ask you to pay your money before you get the good and the goods suited to you. If the home merchant sells his goods at a reasonable prices, the very fact that he pays taxes and rent in your home town entities him to the preference, against and outsider,. Then again, a ranching or farming community with out a home merchant who can handle your produce. What a condition! Many a thrifty rancher's wife buys a goodly share of her groceries, wearing apparel, household goods, etc., with the produce she takes to the country store which would otherwise be wasted or perhaps would not be raised at all. Have you ever heard of a mail order house that offered to rustle a market for your produce? A farming community should be the last one to patronize mail order houses and the first to encourage the home merchant. In most farming communities, there is more produce raised than the local market can consume, consequently and outside market must be found.

Now will it pay you to travel 50 or 100 miles every time you have a few dollars worth of stuff to sell? No indeed. But if you knew that your local "Country store Merchant" would gladly take your lost of butter, eggs, poultry, vegetables or any thing else for that matter and allowed your market price for it, would you not in the end profit more by patronizing your home merchant than by sending away your good money and waiting 30 days for your goods to come? Begin the new year by patronizing the home merchant, who patronizes you. Don't feel that he is your enemy; he is your friend. With a little home pride and a little confidence in one another, we can all help boom the town; and every one will derive some benefit there from.
